Courses taught:

Acting. A course introducing students to the fundamentals of acting: objective, stakes, given circumstances, emotional and physical commitment, action.

Playing Shakespeare. Advanced-level acting course which provides students with the tools necessary to approach Shakespeare's plays and poems: a thorough knowledge of how Shakespeare's text works, an understanding of the historical and cultural contexts of Shakespeare's plays, and an appreciation of Shakespeare's work on the thematic, dramatic, and critical levels.

Playing Chekhov. Advanced-level acting course focusing on the works of Chekhov, with a focus on using close text analysis to find objectives, stakes, and action.

Introduction to Theatre. Course designed to introduce students to the theoretical and practical aspects of live theatre as an artistic form.

Dramaturgy of Shakespeare. A course designed to familiarize students with the dramaturgy of Shakespeare's plays: how they work in a dramatic context, their connection to the Renaissance world view, how and why they work (or don't work) in performance on the live stage.

Graduate Directing Seminar. A lab for directors in the M.F.A program.

Directing II. An Advanced-level course focusing on directing techniques: script analysis, working with actors, collaborating with designers, artistry and individual vision.

Courses taught:

Playing Shakespeare. An advanced-level acting course which focuses on bridging the cultural divide between the renaissance world view and our own; combining a deep understanding of Shakespeare's plays in their own cultural context with an acting lab in which that understanding translates to action.

Guest Artist Seminars:

Shakespeare in Performance. A workshop designed to introduce first year performers to the power of Shakespeare's language and imagery.

Vocal Techniques for Heightened Texts. A workshop which examines poetic and heightened text from a vocal performance standpoint.


